Pastoral letter

Dear friends,

Our Lent discussions have focussed on how we receive Christ in many different ways – through prayer and fellowship, through the stories of scripture coming alive by the work of the Spirit, by our encounters with other people and our sharing in communion. The large group discussing this on Tuesdays has found that we bring different perspectives and personalities to this encounter. We've found that our views on the bible, communion and prayer vary greatly and we need to be sensitive to where each person is coming from. The prayer of Robert Louis Stephenson we've used each time has refocussed us on the unity we share in Christ:

Let peace abound in our small company.

Purge out of every heart the lurking grudge.

Give us grace and strength to forbear and to persevere.

We beseech of thee this help and mercy for Christ's sake.

Justin Welby writes that a good Lent begins with paying attention, with beginning to make straight the way of the Lord by listening. That's about listening to each other (and some of the unheard silenced voices in our world, in contrast to the noisy and abrasive ones.) It's also about listening to God through them, through Scripture, and through stillness and prayer.

But of course Lent is just a preparation, a way of getting ourselves ready to celebrate Easter, the death and resurrection of Jesus and the impact of that on us and on our world. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday and the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. There is excitement in the air, with shouts of 'Hosanna' but foreboding too. Will this Saviour riding a donkey be received or rejected? We know the cries turn to 'crucify' and the Saviour is led out alone to a brutal cross. His disciples run for their lives. Who will receive him now?

Yet on the cross a criminal hanging beside him asks to be remembered and is promised paradise and a hardened centurion is so moved that he cries out: 'Truly this was the Son of God'. Even in the darkest of Good Friday Christ can be received.

I encourage you to enter the Holy Week story, coming to as many of the different services that week as you can or using the 'prayer stations' around the church that week. Enter that darkness and then be led through them to the light and joy of Easter Day – when the risen Lord comes and says to each of us: 'Peace be with you....as the Father sent me, so I send you.' Let's receive and then let's share that peace with joy.

Minister's Sabbatical 20 April – 20 July 2017

Every ten years URC ministers are encouraged to go on a three month sabbatical – a time of refreshment, reflection and study. Having been ordained in 1986 this is my third sabbatical and I am very much looking forward to it. In my first, when I was working in Reading, the highlight was walking the Thames path, stopping at retreat centres and the homes of friends along the way. During that time I wrote prayers and reflections entitled *The River of God*. In 2006 when I was minister at Romsey and Braishfield, I focussed on prayer in Luke's gospel resulting in the published book, *God's Embrace: praying with Luke's Gospel*. That time I walked part of the South West coast path with my son Tom, another great experience.

This time I have four strands to my sabbatical:

- Time to reflect on ministry in changing times, looking at the distinctive role of ordained ministers in the URC. I will be meeting up with a number of ministers over the three months and starting the sabbatical by going to the Sheldon Centre in Devon, for what they call 'the 12,000 mile service'.
- Pilgrimage, walking St Cuthbert's Way with Elizabeth to Holy Island (Lindisfarne) and then visiting Durham (where Cuthbert, one of the great Celtic saints and pioneers, is buried).
- Studying the church's response to the environmental crisis facing our planet, visiting eco churches in the London area and staying at the Hilfield Friary in Dorset (which has been awarded a gold award for its eco project). My aim is to see the progress eco churches have made (and difficulties they have faced) in turning policy into action. Thank you to all who filled in the questionnaire on this subject. It has helped to see the range of views on this subject.
- An updating of my knowledge of and skills in using computer technology in church life.

Full cover is being provided while I am away. In relation to any church or pastoral matters please contact in the first place our Church Secretary, Kate Yates (or any of the elders). Where the need is for an ordained minister they can then refer you to one of our local URC ministers. Can I ask you to give the elders and visiting ministers and preachers your full support and encouragement in all the vital work they are doing? Thank you.

Wycombe Homeless Connection - 10 years of rebuilding lives



It's now 10 years since we started. In that time we've helped thousands of local people in housing crisis, who have nowhere else to turn. To mark the occasion we have appointed our first Patron, the Countess Howe, a valued supporter for several years. Our charity is planning several special events this year, including a Feel Good Day in July, to give local homeless people a chance to pamper themselves. And another date for the diary: the biggest and best ever Big Sleepout will take place at All Saints Church, High Wycombe on Friday 24th November.

With night shelter attendance currently about 5% up on last year, it's clear that the need for our services is stronger than ever. We've helped 450 people in the last 12 months, which is a huge number for a town the size of High Wycombe. ZIMBABWE



Chalinzima Fodi is a 19-year-old girl who lives with her Aunt, Enestia Mudenda, near Lubu a village in Binga, Zimbabwe.

Chalinzima is severely disabled with multiple diagnoses. In the past she has attempted to go to school as she is physically able to get there. However, once there the teachers were not trained to cope with her needs. Her speech impairment means that she is not able to express herself and she gets very frustrated with change and different surroundings. Her mood changes rapidly when she is unsure or confronted by something new and she was removed from school when violent outbursts made it clear she was not coping with the challenges.

Chalinzima is the third child of five and as she is most comfortable and relaxed when she is on her own, she lives with her Aunt, who loves her and has cared for her since she was eight.

Enestia is an inspiring woman who has a large reserve of love and patience. Since Chalinzima came to live with her, she has been trying to teach her to fetch water and to manage her own personal care, unfortunately, both with no success.

Enestia asks for nothing, but prays for strength and that Chalinzima will one day be able to look after her own personal care and fetch water.

Current statistics show that over 4 million people in Zimbabwe are food insecure as a result of the El Nino induced drought, especially as the peak of the hunger season sets in. Food is therefore the major priority for rural households at the moment, at the expense of some longer term programme work geared towards building long term resilience. This means projects such as gardening projects are being neglected due to both water shortages and households spending. Much time is spent looking for food.

The majority of crops planted during 2015/16 season were a complete write off. In Binga, where the programme is focussing on formal and informal education, drops in school attendances are being reported where there are no complimentary school feeding programmes. Unfortunately, the programme has not managed to get sufficient funding to integrate food assistance in all its areas of operation. The current emergency funding has been raised through the ACT Appeal process and is available up to the end of December 2016. So far only Insiza and Lupane districts are receiving assistance, reaching out to just over 8,000 individuals.

Christian Aid has noted that communities are resorting to negative and asset depleting coping strategies in the face of the ongoing food crisis. For example, where emergency interventions are providing cash for the purchase of both food and seeds, communities are tending only to buy food, and not think ahead to the importance of planting seeds for the next season.

A message from the Lighthouse team:

We're looking forward to a great Lighthouse Week 24-28 July. The database is now fully open for helpers to register. Those that helped last year would have already received an invitation. For them it's very easy as their details are already there and just need to be confirmed or amended if there have been any changes. For the rest, it's just easy! Go to <https://lighthousecentral.org/> and click on "Register". Instructions are pretty clear from that point, but I'm available to help if anyone has difficulties or does not have access to on-line facilities.

As Lighthouse reaches wider, the amount of administrative support we can expect from the central office will necessarily diminish. We can't expect the same degree of personal service as the number of lighthouses using the central system keeps growing. I'm therefore looking for some help in the admin area - not necessarily involving attendance on site in July, but people prepared to use their own laptop and internet access and work from home in the preceding weeks. The work is not going to increase by a huge amount this year, but if a team can be built up it will be good preparation for 2018 when I expect we will have to take more weight in areas such as obtaining references. Anyone prepared to do this (whether they intend to be on site or not) should register as "Admin".

Something else which may appeal to the more mature amongst us (though anyone over 18 is acceptable) is new this year. We are looking for lunch supervisors just to spend an hour or so a day on site giving some relief to leaders so they can have their own lunches in relative peace. Younger children sometimes need help opening drinks cartons without showering everyone around, there is a need to watch for the occasional "runner", etc. Please register as "Extra Helpers".

Another part-time and more relaxing job is supervising the "Quiet Room". Ideal for people who can't come for the whole week, but just prepared to be on a rota. No running about, so particularly suitable for older and wiser helpers. Many of the children in this environment will benefit from one-to-one conversation and prayer.

It makes life easier for everyone if leaders/helpers register as early as possible. Of course, things can happen between now and July, and there are always some people who have to drop out later for very good reasons. All we ask is, let us know.
