## ***Pastoral letter***

Dear friends,

May I wish you a very happy Pentecost when the day arrives!

What day you may ask? The festival of the Holy Spirit is much neglected compared to the feasts of Christmas and Easter. People can relate to the birth of a child and the death of a man, though the resurrection and life of Christ among us here and now may be more of a challenge and talk of the Holy Spirit can leave people confused. There are certainly no commercial tie ins to this festival. The Spirit of God can't be bottled or marketed. As Jesus explained the wind of God's Spirit blows where it wills. It cannot be controlled by us human beings; it works where God wills.

Yet it was this Spirit that gave the church its birth almost 2000 years ago and enabled the first disciples to share and live out the good news of God's love in Jesus. As the great Christian thinker, the apostle Paul, wrote: 'God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that God has given us.' (Romans 5.5)

In a glorious book John Taylor described the Holy Spirit as 'the Go-between God' enabling true connection and communication and compassion to blossom in the lives of Jesus' followers and in the world at large. If we read the story of Pentecost in Acts we find the Spirit both gathers the first disciples, stirring up within them unity, joy and worship, but also sends them out to share that experience with people of very varied backgrounds, breaking down all the barriers that divide people.

I pray that that same Spirit of God will be at work in the Church here in High Wycombe, drawing Christians together and enabling them to share the joy and hope they have received. And I pray that Trinity Church may be a key and creative part of that on Pentecost Sunday when Christians from across the town and beyond gather on the Rye for a Love Wycombe worship event.

Please come and share in that special morning (the date is Sunday 20 May, with a prayer time in church at 10.30 am and then the main event on the Rye at 11.30 am, followed by stalls, refreshments and picnic). Pray for the event and support it in whatever way you can. Happy Pentecost!

## ZIMBABWE

### Meeting your family's needs



Kombo village, Ward 22, is a new township in Matabeleland South with few opportunities to work or grow. Zimbabwe Project Trust (ZimPro) and Dabane Trust, supported by Christian Aid Zimbabwe, have been working with Insiza Rural District Council to encourage them to be committed to the government's new small and medium enterprise policy. This would mean that people could apply for licences for shops and workshops. Until now, ZimPro and Dabane have been working to offer training in a variety of skills so local people could open micro enterprises. However, space to work and sell has been a problem and this makes a huge difference. Now that the Council supports the policy, Christian Aid's partners will be able to move onto other areas to help new groups train in vocational skills.



Sikhathele, seen on the left and Simisosenkosa have been part of the Nyathela leather group for five years and are well established. Today the group is four strong and all have become skilled in working in leather. The machinery and training needed was supplied by the partners. Today,

school shoes are popular because children, the world over, are always growing out of shoes before they are worn out. Adults prefer flip flops or pumps. A pair of shoes takes 4 to 5 hours to make from scratch so the finished article must be saleable. Making satchels, Bible and phone pouches has extended their range and allowed for a little creativity. As a result of the training and support from the Christian Aid partners, many things have changed for the better. Having learnt it is good to diversify, Sikhathele has bought livestock and paid for school fees. Villagers who are part of these micro enterprise groups have seen new income coming in and so have been more able to meet their family needs which has, in turn, built up their selfconfidence. And the shoes are great too!

## IMPORTANT DATA PRIVACY STATEMENT

The new General Data Protection Regulation comes into force on 25 May. The Elders as “Data Controller” have to inform you of our Data Privacy Statement.

The full Data Privacy Statement is pinned on our internal noticeboards in full, but for ease of reproduction, some key points are outlined below:-

### How we process your personal data

The eldership of Trinity United Reformed Church complies with its obligations under the “GDPR” by keeping personal data up to date; by storing and destroying it securely; by not collecting or retaining excessive amounts of data; by protecting personal data from loss, misuse, unauthorised access and disclosure and by ensuring that appropriate technical measures are in place to protect personal data.

We use personal data for the following purposes: -

- to administer membership records;
- to celebrate birthdays and share pastoral care and concern
- to maintain our financial accounts and records (including the processing of gift aid);
- to provide news and information about events, activities and services at the church;
- to fundraise and promote the interests of the church;
- to manage employees and volunteers;
- to enable the church to provide voluntary services for the benefit of the public in our local community;
- to manage hire of the building and contact with hirers and users
- to provide contact details of officers and others with specific responsibilities (e.g. DBS signatories) to the synod office and Church House. This enables the synod and national administration of the United Reformed Church.

## **Christian Aid Week 2018**

This Christian Aid Week, we are inviting people to come together to support the thousands of people in Haiti, who regularly experience some of the worst natural disasters on earth.

Today, more than 40 million people across the globe are forced from their homes, and yet remain within their own country. They outnumber refugees two to one.

In countries like Haiti, where repeated natural disasters have resulted in thousands of people being forced to flee their homes, they are often not able to return for years.

People like Vilia who was left homeless by the earthquake in 2010. Following the disaster, she no longer recognised her home or neighbourhood, among the crumbling houses. Devastatingly, she never found her mother.

Bereaved and homeless, Vilia and her husband and seven children, found life a struggle. They didn't even have a safe place to sleep.

Even now, eight years after the devastating earthquake that hit the capital, Port-au-Prince, an estimated 38,000 people are still displaced.

Hurricane Matthew, in November 2016, wreaked further havoc across the south of the country, destroying up to 90% of some areas. Each time a crisis hits, people lose their dwellings and livelihoods, making it increasingly hard for them to rebuild.

Our local partner, KORAL, helps local people prepare for disasters. In the aftermath of the earthquake, they reached out to Vilia and built her family and many others a new home, safe, stable and strong enough to withstand natural disasters.

Ahead of Hurricane Matthew, KORAL warned local communities, helping evacuate around 5,000 families and saving many lives. In the immediate aftermath Christian Aid and KORAL distributed urgently-needed shelter kits, hygiene kits, food seeds and cash transfers. could pay to train a local builder in Haiti to build a safe, secure home for families.

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£25 could buy a hygiene kit to prevent disease after a disaster; £5 could buy a jar of seeds for growing beans to feed a family; and £210 could pay to train a local builder in Haiti to build a safe, secure home for families.

## “Why would there have been holes in Jesus’ hands and feet after He had risen?”

It’s that time of year, again .. (!) .. and we have once again had the opportunity to lead numerous Easter workshops. This year we have led six workshops in partnership with three churches.

It is such a privilege, having the opportunity *to share the greatest moment in history with children*, to share with them why it is so important for Christians ... and indeed everyone! Every year, the workshops are (on the whole) similar, but each and every year it feels fresh and exciting as we explore the Easter story with a different group of children. The story never changes, but the responses and reactions certainly do!

All the workshops have been a joy to be a part of but one particularly stands out to me, as right from the get go, *this group of children were absolutely full of questions*. We started off by considering the question ‘Who is Jesus?’; as the children started to discuss, they were asking questions such as ‘Well, is Jesus father or son?’ and ‘Was God Jesus’ stepdad if Joseph was His dad?’. Later, as we explored the Easter story we had further questions such as ‘How could Judas betray Jesus when Jesus told him to do it?’ and ‘Why would there have been holes in Jesus’ hands and feet after He had risen?’. In fact, there were so many amazing questions, that we adapted the session to end with a time of Q&A; a time that could have continued much longer than we were able!

Some questions we were able to answer based on what the Bible tells us; for others we shared that we don’t have a definitive answer but encouraged them they were great questions. For me, the highlight this year was seeing *the children REALLY engage with the Easter story*, not just as something they were being told, but *really wrestling and grappling with those big questions*.

***Please do pray for the children that they would continue to reflect on all they have heard; that they would continue to ask questions and seek God for the answers. Pray that Jesus’ love and truth would be known and experienced.***



## FAREWELL ALI PRESTON

Past and present WHC staff were snapped together at well-attended event marking the retirement of Ali Preston, WHC's first-ever staff member. Ali was taken on to run Wycombe Winter Night Shelter when it started in 2008, and even during that first season, she began helping people find accommodation. Ali set the tone for the ministry of WHC and was held in great esteem by guests, volunteers, staff and trustees alike.

## SECRETS OF THE SHELTER

A lot of work goes on behind the scenes so that the shelter can happen. Di and the coordinators battled to reinforce the shift teams in spite of illnesses and snow. Meanwhile, every day, staff prepared the admission lists. To keep things safe, everyone was risk-assessed with the police beforehand to ensure they had no history of violence. The lists changed as we helped people find accommodation – between January and February alone, 15 people were resettled. Demand was high – but there were often spare places, because on any given night, someone might find a sofa, or prefer to stay out. Some individuals could not be admitted if they were too drunk or high. Even when the council was running its Severe Weather Emergency Protocol, a very few still preferred to stay out. Some social media contributors worried that nothing was being done for them, when actually it was their choice. We've known those individuals for years, and we will help them if they choose. By the end of March, we expected to have provided over 900 bed-nights and 1800 meals. In the words of one of our guests: "Awesome!"
